#### Let's take the mystery out of reporting.

GFWC-GA will continue using the Google forms for 2021 reporting. A Practice link is available to for a refresher on inputting a report. Not to worrying this is for practice only so the data is used only for instructional purposes.

Regardless of the method that is used for reporting you need the information below to prepare the report. Start now gathering your information and it will be a much easier process.

Question: What information do you need to complete GFWC-GA end of year reports for your club?

Answer: Use the Reports Worksheet as a guide: Total number of projects, hours, dollars donated, inkind donations. Additionally if applicable, you will need to break out affiliate project information. For narratives you will need the name of project and number of volunteers.

Remember the following and you will be ready to hit the ground running for a GREAT report!

#### REPORTING REMINDERS

- 1. Follow the GFWC GA Plan of Work.
- 2. Stick to the reporting period: Jan 1 Dec 31.
- 3. Pay dues by December 1.
- 4. Pay dues on the same number to District, State or Jr. Conference.

- 5. Complete the online reporting questions.
- 6. Place projects in the appropriate category (CSP or other program area), according to intent.
- 7. File by the deadline: January 25 at 11:59 PM.
- 8. Remember these definitions:
- Number of Members in Club = # for which dues are paid by Dec 1st
- Volunteer Hours = # Members X # Hours worked on Club project
- Dollars Donated = Money given by Club through Club treasury
- In-Kind Donations = Value of items donated for project
- Annual Club Report = Statistical data (required)
- Narrative of Top Ten Projects (optional)
- Creative/Outstanding Project (optional)

We plan to have a reporting workshop refresher later in the Fall. Do not hesitate to call if you have questions.

September 8 is International Literacy Day - What exactly is literacy? Miriam-Webster Dictionary defines literacy as "the quality or state of being literate: educated...able to read and write." Because you can read this post and no doubt spend a lot of time reading online, it may seem incredulous to learn there are people living and working in your own community who not only cannot read this post, but are unable to read a book, a restaurant road sign, a voting ballot, an instruction manual, a prescription bottle label, or a cereal box.



Can you imagine navigating modern-day life without the basic ability to read and write? Wiping out illiteracy in every local community around the world is what International Literacy Day is all about.

40% – the percentage of American third-grade students who read at grade level.

75% – the percentage of children who will struggle to read their whole lives if they fall behind at age nine.

1 in 4 – the number of boys who suffer from some level of dyslexia.

1 in 5 – the number of students who suffer from learning differences.

1/₃ – the fraction of America's struggling readers who belong to college-educated families.

90% – the percentage of the literacy rate globally for all males.

82.7% – the percentage of literacy rate globally for all females.

Our Environment State Chairman just presented a wonderful workshop at GA Institute, you all receive the NW District communications and Cimi downloaded all the information into the Institute Recap Newsletter. Please read it for great ideas

Please think about food for wildlife and think native plants, they have been here a long time and thrive where imports struggle... Bees need flowers that carry pollen and a yard without insecticides.... Think natural pest control. Our most endangered species: BEES. Tour gardens and wildflower meadows that give your members ideas of pollinator plants for them to add to their gardens. Our



club is attending a garden center lecture and tour of their natives species this month. Bee City USA is a great organization nationwide you can help your City join.

Check with Scout leaders in your area to sponsor, with an interview and some financial help, Eagle Scout projects that pertain to this CSP.

PROJECT IDEA: Promote all the native plant sales going on this fall... Recycling can be done all year long.. If you have items you don't know what to do with, CHARM in Atlanta does, take a look at livethrive.org/charm.

Do know, per Cathy Jones, that all personal donations to Club promoted projects must go through the Club books to be reported in your state report. Time to start gathering your projects for 2021 reporting to state.

August 20, 2021 was National Honeybee Day. To celebrate the day a Honey Tasting was shared by those attending the Environment CSP Institute Workshop. Ideas were shared for projects and the

Top Ten Projects from last year were highlighted.

- 1. Detective Seymore Green Puppet Show (GFWC Service Guild of Covington, 4 members, 20 hours, \$500.00 in–kind donation) Four members practiced and performed with KCNB's puppet team to help perform the Detective Seymore Green & Buster Clean the Bases puppet show at First Presbyterian Church of Covington for Girl Scout Troop 18012 and their families and friends. The show educated nearly 30 children about the importance of litter prevention and water pollution prevention using fun characters, a story, and songs.
- 2. Recycling Club (GFWC Marietta Woman's Club, 16 members, 36 hours) We organized a recycling club of 16 student from all of the fifth-grade class at a local elementary school. We collected and donated 250 groceries bags and taught them to crochet these bags into matts. They intended to donate these matts to the homeless for them to use as bedding or as a cover, however Covid-19 happened. Therefore, the unfished matt was reproduced into another usable item that are to be given to the State winners of the Environment Challenge Project.
- **3.** International World Peace Rose Garden (GFWC Atlanta Woman's Club, 38 members, 40 hours, \$2140.00 donated, 444.00 in-kind) IWPRG is a catalyst for peace around the world. The nonprofit was established to create beautiful rose gardens for peace on public lands. There are ten gardens and the MLK Jr. Historical Park is one of those sacred grounds. The "I have a dream" rose garden was established in 1992. AWC has partnered with this organization since 2015 to maintain the garden and to support an annual celebration honoring the student winners of the messages of peace poems that line the border of the rose garden.
- **4. Special Needs Garden Therapy** (GFWC Lawrenceville Woman's Club, 5 members,3 hours, \$78.95 donated, \$125.00 in-kind) In partnership with the Lawrenceville Garden Club, a member wrote a grant application for \$125, requiring matching funds, for a Garden Therapy project. The project was for the Young Adults Learning Life Skills (YALLS) students. Grant money was used to purchase soil, tools, and seeds/plants to maintain 4 raised bed gardens. Environment furnished a cash contribution. We renewed a 2-year subscription to National Wildlife Federation's Ranger Rick magazine for elementary school age children.



#### Challenge #2

Each GFWC Georgia District is challenged to increase the total number of individuals who contribute to the Ella F. White Endowment Fund during the 2021 calendar year.

#### WINNING CRITERIA:

Challenge #1

The District that increases their total club contributions by the greatest dollar amount will be the winner of a \$50 cash prize.

Challenge #2

The District that increases the total number of individual members contributing to the EFW Fund will be the winner of a \$50 cash prize.

#### NOTES:

Qualifying club contributions (\$25 and greater) can be submitted with state dues for a club and must be received by the GFWC Georgia State Office postmarked no later than December 1, 2021. Contributions made to the EFW fund individually must be made payable to GFWC Georgia, with "Ella F. White" in the memo line, and sent to the State Office no later than December 1, 2021. Contributions in the amount of \$25 and greater will qualify.

The prizes will be awarded to the winning Districts at the 2022 GFWC Georgia State Convention in Peachtree City.
