


Fall Newsletter - October 2025

Valuable Insights and Practical Tips from our NW District Leaders

We are fortunate to have outstanding leaders in our district. Below are their articles, where they share their valuable knowledge and expertise. We encourage you to explore these pieces, as we are confident you will find them helpful and applicable to your club activities.

Announcements from your 1st VP Judine Heard

Thank you to the clubs that participated in the Membership Recruitment Campaigns during the last 12 months. The year-to-date new member total is not available; however, as of December 2024, the North West District membership was 460, an increase of 105 members during that same period in 2023.

As we gear up for the Fall Membership Campaign, with its focus on "Member Value and Benefits of Belonging" and with State Dues and Membership Roster forms due December 1, now is a good time to review your roster to determine who has not been active and reach out to each person. Often people who have been members less than 24 months will not renew because they do not feel vested in the organization.

As stated in GFWC Georgia's membership booklet "Mysteries of Membership":

It is just as important to retain your veteran members as it is to recruit new ones. Most people do not leave a club because the volunteer work was unfulfilling—it was because a connection was

not made with the members. Spend some time being reflective about your club members and if everyone is doing everything, they can make connections with veterans as well as new members.

Retaining our current members is as critical as recruiting new members. Contact each person who has not regularly attended meetings or participated in any activity during the last twelve months. Ask why she has not been active, be empathic to the reason and be prepared to offer a possible solution and share some of the "the benefits of belonging."

Finally, while the duties of recruiting are the first vice president's or membership chairman's responsibilities, we all should occasionally check-in with club sisters who we have not noticed at meetings. A quick call (or card) might be beneficial to the person you are contacting.

The character count was increased last year so you should be able to include the who, what, when, where, how and why of your projects. In your reports share the impact of your specific project.

We plan to have a Zoom workshop on reporting sometime this fall. Stay tuned for the date and the details.

It is no surprise to any of our clubs that this is the time of year that we collect dues. Actually, per our State Bylaws, Article XIV Districts, Section 2 Dues: *C. District dues are due June1. For a club or its members to be eligible for District, State, or National awards, its dues must be paid no later than December 1st.*

Our biggest problem with collecting dues is the US Mail. Every year we have some clubs who faithfully mail their dues and they get hung up in the postal system somewhere. This delay does not excuse the club from having their dues received at the state and district level by December 1st. A suggestion from other clubs is to cut off your membership on October 1 and pay your club's dues on that number of members. This allows you to submit your dues having enough time to send them through the mail...or, you could bring your check to the Fall District Meeting in person on October 25th. If you send your dues and your membership changes you may file an amended submission paying for the additional members. When sending your dues please make the check payable to GFWC NORTH WEST DISTRICT and send to Barbara Reynolds, Treasurer.

Treasurer@gfwcgeorgia.org. These options only apply to state dues and unfortunately are not available for district dues.

We in the NW part of GA don't have a National Park in our area but we are blessed with wonderful National Recreation Areas, County and City Parks. The programs and tours they can provide are exciting, informative and fun.

As an example we have had the director of our city's Parks and Recreation talk about current

and future developments in one of the local parks and share with us the needs and wants for the year and submitted requests to help the local parks grow. Touring a county park and how unusable land can be turned into a historic site and wonderful park with things like bogs and flood planes being utilized. Also, National Recreation Areas have knowledgeable National Rangers who are always ready to provide a program filled with useful information on how a club can provide assistance. Our club toured Island Ford with a fascinating ranger who has served for over 50 years. A few ways for us to celebrate the anniversary of the founding of your nation. National Parks were founded and 1916 and we celebrate the day on August 25th, parks are under the US Dept. of Interior and provides over 84 million acres in all fifty states.

It makes it easier to connect clubs around the world to each other and to our work as a whole organization. - If Your Club Name Is Longer Than 30 Characters, Use Two Lines.
- Using GFWC In Front Of Your Name Is Not Necessary In This Format.
- Be aware that users cannot download transparent background files unless they are Canva Pro users.
 Free for nonprofits that have their own Tax ID, you must register using your individual club name, not GFWC National.

chairs (Lois Wolfe and Brenda Price) in facilitating the GFWC GA Institute Legislation and Public Policy Session on August 16, 2025, in Macon, GA. Efforts continued to focus on signing up members for the GFWC Legislative Action Center, a powerful tool to alert members to GFWC's public issues and advocacy efforts. Track bills, contact your local representative and take action on issues germane to GFWC. The LAC is open ended with three suggestive ways for Club presidents to signup members to accomplish goals.

1) Appoint a club Legislative chair (LC) or member from the Civic Engagement Committee to implement legislative actions recommended by the District and State Chairs. 2) Instruct and sign up members at monthly meetings. and notify (LM) when signed ups are confirmed (receive points) 3. Include the legislative action center

Legislative and Public Policy Spotlight Club Projects:

Kudos to the following clubs who were spotlighted at GFWC GA Institute on August 16, 2025, for their Legislative and Public Policy Projects: Dunwoody Woman's Club - Advocated for more Animal Shelters by working with local commissioners. Their efforts will help DeKalb County decide to expand their current facility that will accommodate an additional 26 animals. Morrow Civic Woman's Club -Increased their Advocating Power for an increase in funding for domestic violence victim services and support of SB 324, a victim-centered address confidentially bill. They wrote letters and took them to their representatives on Stand with Survivors Day at the Capitol. Stone Mountain Woman's Club – Held Mini Legislative Action Center Classes in January and broaden their classes to include the introduction of the Legislative Ladder. They used various methods such as the use of whiteboards, registration tables after meetings, and lunches. They also discuss health and wellness projects such as the Alzheimer's Project Act. They also reached out to two state legislators to join GFWC Legislative Action Center.

The members of the Civic **Engagement and Outreach CSP** volunteered at the site of the future Compassionate Atlanta park adjacent to Wallers Coffee Shop in Decatur. Club members created inspirational signs that will be hung throughout the park.

The park was created by Compassion Atlanta to give parents and caregivers with small children a place to be able to participate in community events and, along with Waller's Coffee Shop, to be a gathering place for local non-profit groups and events.

This year, the BWC has been working on strengthening our relationship with Our House, a thrift store in neighboring Cedartown that owns and operates a shelter that provides a temporary safe house for victims of domestic violence and their children. We recently became aware that this facility does not provide personal care items like shampoo, conditioner, toothpaste etc., and not all of the residents have family or friends to supply these things, so we have begun to include these and other useful items in our BINGO gift bags.

On October 2nd, quite a few of our members will be involved in pulling and preparing several hundred pounds of pork for the October 3rd annual BBQ to benefit the beautiful Buchanan Library that our Club was instrumental in establishing in 2003. This task is always a lot of fun, and I can't wait to get started!

October 2, 2025–trip for club members to Tallulah Falls School to tour the campus and visit the State office.


We are publishing a cookbook! Through the summer we collected over 350 recipes from current, recent and long ago members, and added personal and historical tidbits of

My guiding quote is "The journey of a thousand miles begins with one step."


